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## Presidents' Message

### Medicare Challenge

Around the time our last newsletter was mailed, we started receiving emails and phone calls from our members with questions about Medicare. It seemed that there were concerns as to whether they should be checking on the information they were seeing on television or replying to letters they were receiving about the wonderfulness of some Medicare plans being offered. These ads are for Medicare Advantage Plans being offered by private insurance companies. The answer we gave was the same to all: **"Please. Do. Nothing! Do not leave original Medicare because you will lose NYSHIP!"** You will just have to cover your ears or change the station during the Medicare Annual Election Period (AEP) that lasted from Oct 15 to Dec 7 every year even if it is Joe Namath or JJ Walker from "Good Times" speaking to you!

### A More Promising NYS Executive Budget

Governor Kathy Hochul's Executive Budget for 2022-2023 presents some important commitments toward meeting the needs of our school community. The \$12.75 billion in aid provided through the State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF), under the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act 2021, has placed NYS on a more solid financial standing than previous years. The governor's spending plan is very promising on several initiatives but with others, such as higher education, the increases proposed in this budget is not enough to fix more than a decade of neglect and underfunding. We just have to see how the final enacted budget develops as it winds along on its legislative road. The following are some of the positive aspects of the budget:

- Includes a total of \$31.28 billion in school aid – each district will receive a minimum year-to-year increase of 3% in Foundation Aid.
- Provides \$10 million in grant funding for school districts to be used for student mental health support.
- Continues to provide \$250 million in community school funding
- Funding for Teacher-Mentor Intern and Teachers of Tomorrow Programs
- Provides \$14.26 million for Teacher Centers and \$368,000 for teachers preparing for National Board Certification.
- Funding for libraries.
- Additional financial aid to 4201, 4410, Special Act and 853 schools

- AND no changes to Medicare Reimbursement

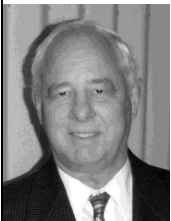
### NYSUT's Future Forward Taskforce

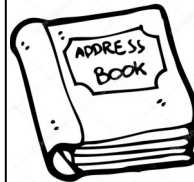

## Medicare Reimbursement Reminder

In order to receive reimbursement for Medicare Part B premiums you paid in 2021, you must submit the following:

- A copy of your 2021 FORM SSA-1099 from Social Security (not from ERS or TRS) – This is required for all retirees.
  - The completed and signed attestation form mailed to you from the district in December
- Those paying Medicare/IRMAA premiums directly to Medicare by check or credit card must submit the following in lieu of Form SSA-1099: copies of monthly bills from the Dept of Human Services, titled, NOTICE OF MEDICARE PREMIUM DUE and proof of payment for each month (e.g. copies of bank or credit card statements, and/or cancelled checks).

December 13, 2020

- An update on Middle School activities, was presented by the HBT Middle School Student Council Representative, including the return of sports, extracurricular clubs, charity, and food drives.
